


EDUCATION TODAY for LEADERSHIP TOMORROW

The Vanessa Grant Girls' School is the biggest of the Vanessa Grant Trust projects and is a residential not-for-profit selective school for girls of secondary age. The trust provides as may assisted places as possible for bright girls from challenged backgrounds. Currently 38% are provided with fee support.

The sense of relief in the school now that the schedule is back to normal is palpable and the renewed sense of purpose by teachers and staff alike is exciting. Competency Based Curriculum: at the last minute, just as the school was poised to welcome its first intake of 12-year-old students, the government decreed that all Junior Secondary School students would be catered for within the existing primary schools. This was disappointing news indeed. The school is lobbying for a change in policy here.



The classroom: the school achieved outstanding KCSE exam results in Computer Studies, Home Science, Agriculture and French. While most other results were also strong, Maths and Science were again weak. To rectify this, the school has been lucky enough to benefit from the professional services of Penn Kirk, an accredited International Schools' inspector, who, very generously, gave a week of her time free of charge. She observed classes in action and ran workshops for teachers. These were so well received that she has offered to return in October and again January 2024. In addition to this, the school contracted the services of a specialist Maths and Science educational consultant, Lillian Nyaranga, to do the same, but with specific focus on Maths and Science. We hope to see evidence of positive impact.

Diaspora Students

- 1. **Faith Ndanu** is on track to graduate from Smith College in 2024 with a bachelor's degree. She recently had an internship with Litemore Ltd in the Banking and Finance department.
- 2. **Miriam Waceke Kimani** graduated in 2022 from Lafayette College with an engineering degree. Last fall, Miriam was invited to be part of one of the panels for the #GetHerThere event, which was broadcast on CNN and is an initiative by the Obama Foundation's Girls Opportunity Alliance to educate and empower girls. She now works for a water engineering firm in NY.
- 3. **Winfred Syombua Mulwa** is in her senior year at Mt Holyoke College and will soon be graduating with two bachelor's degrees in Mathematics and Biology. Last summer, she interned with The Samburu Project, mentoring young girls at the schools in The Samburu Project's network.

Exeter Program

1. **Branice Yiamoi Karia** graduated in 2017 with a bachelor's degree in Public Health from Jomo Kenyatta University and is now working as a Medical Laboratory Officer at Community Health Partners. She also continues to support her community in a variety of ways, including as a Gender officer for the Talek Youth Association, Data Collection and analysis officer for Empower Her East Africa project, and the Secretary of the board for the Empower Her East Africa project.

Yale Young Scholars Program

- Fridah Senteyion will graduate in September with a law degree from Masinde Muliro
 University ad in addition to being a mentor with the Tanari Trust, counseling young girls
 from her community, she recently had an internship with the Judiciary- Kajiado Law
 Courts.
- Stacy Karimi Murugi is studying Medical Laboratory at Kenyatta University and will be graduating with a bachelor's degree this year. She recently had an internship as a Laboratory Officer at Mbagathi Hospital.



Brief reports on the six other projects supported by the VGT follow.

Flames of Hope

This is the youngest of the VGT projects. It opened its doors in January 2018. It is Naomi Ndungu's brainchild. While she was the Head Teacher at the Vanessa Grant Special School, she had particular success in enabling children with limited or no speech to be able to communicate. This is a residential school that also accepts nursery age children daily.

Water

The challenge of a lack of water at Flames of Hope has not been resolved, but the decision has been taken to link the school to the borehole supply from the VGGS, which is about 200 m away. Thanks to generous supporters in Australia, there is a plan to convert the pump to solar and so reduce the cost for both schools.

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Volunteers

Thanks to a very active group of volunteers, Flames of Hope now has a useful shaded sand pit, which has been in full use since the recent term restarted.

<u>Vanessa Grant Special School</u>. (VGSS)

This was the first project undertaken by the VGT and is a residential public school for forty children with special needs. It opened its doors in 2000 and has developed steadily since then.

The school is thriving. Dyna, the Deputy Head, is doing a wonderful job in the pre-vocational class with the craft work she is helping the children produce. The school is very fortunate to have the services of Mufu Luvai, a professional music therapist. She is having particular success with some of the more autistic children.

Security has been improved at the school by raising the level of the surrounding wall and building a guardhouse at the gate, to be better control who comes and goes. The kitchen and dining area have been transformed by renovations and all is now tiled which is so much easier to clean.



Vocational Training School

The Vocational Training School was another of Naomi Ndungu's ideas when it became clear that there was no suitable place for the children from the VGSS to proceed to once they had to move on. This is a residential school for 40 boys and girls run by Peggy, Naomi's daughter.

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Gogar Primary School

Gogar Primary School is a public school that the trust started supporting in 2012 by linking it to Cheltenham College and undertaking additional fund raising to refurbish and build new classrooms, renovate the latrines, build a library, staffroom, computer room, and kitchen and provide a water supply. Numbers at the school have increased from 300 to 900 day students today.

The Head Teacher, Mr Ngetich, has expressed his sincere thanks to the valuable commitment shown by this year's group of volunteers to life both in and outside the classroom.









